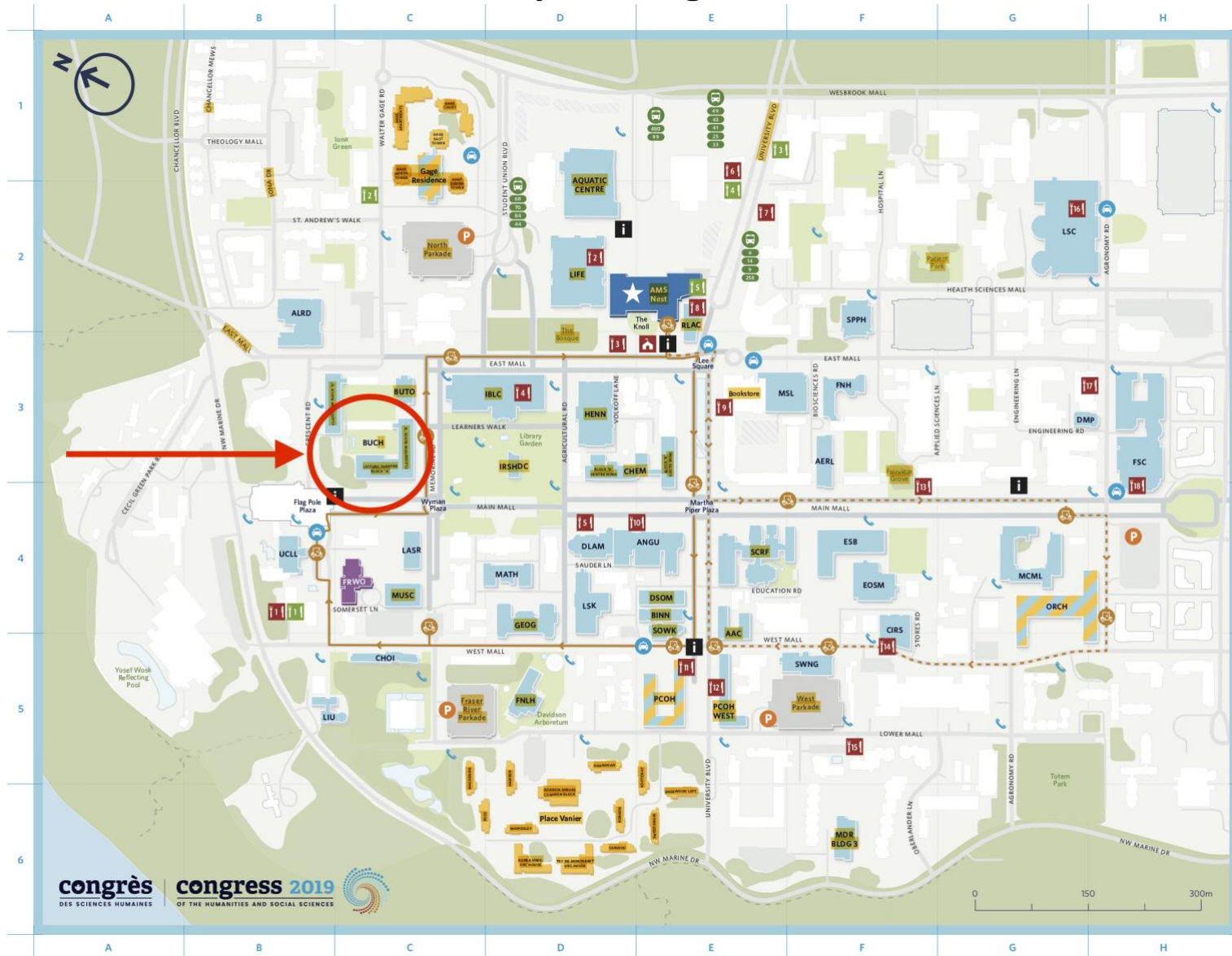

Who and what is reflected in individual course syllabi, and in the curriculum in various sites?
